<p><b>Eye rhyme.</b> This refers to rhymes based on similarity of spelling rather than sound. Often these are highly conventional, and reflect historical changes in pronunciation: love/move/prove, why/envy.</p>	<p>Word from brainstorm: _____</p> <p>Eye rhyme: _____</p>
<p><b>Identical rhyme.</b> A word rhymes with itself, as in Emily Dickinson's "Because I Could not Stop for Death": We paused before a house that seemed A Swelling of the Ground-- The Roof was scarcely visible-- The Cornice--in the Ground.</p>	<p>Word from brainstorm: _____</p> <p>Identical rhyme: _____</p>
